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Pairings set for Unified Flag Football State Tournament

The Indiana High School Athletic Association announced the pairings for the Fifth Annual Unified Flag Football State Tournament Series this evening via livestream at IHSAAtv.org.

Forty-one (41) teams have entered this year's state tournament and are spread across eight sectionals to be played on Saturday, Oct. 1. The eight teams that emerge as sectional champions will move on to one of two regionals on Saturday, Oct. 8 with the two remaining teams advancing to the state championship game on Saturday, Oct. 15 at the Grand Park Sports Event Center in Westfield.

Last year's state champion, the DeKalb Barons, will meet Wawasee in a Sectional 2 first round game at Central Noble while 2021 state runner-up, the Franklin Central Flashes, drew a bye and will await the Martinsville-Franklin Community winner in Sectional 7 played at Mooresville.

Last year's state championship game between DeKalb and Franklin Central is available to watch via IHSAAtv.org.

Unified Sports enables persons with and without intellectual disabilities to participate on the same team for sports training and competition as part of the "Champions Together" partnership between the IHSAA and Special Olympics Indiana.



Unified Flag Football, played on a 25-yard by 40-yard field, is five-on-five with three athletes and two unified partners to a side. Teams play two 20-minute halves with a touchdown worth six points, an extra point from the five-yard line worth one point while two points are added for a successful play from the 10-yard line. Two points may also be scored for a safety.

Starting on its five-yard line, a team has four plays to cross mid-field, then an additional four plays to score a touchdown. Failure to cross mid-field or score a touchdown in the prescribed number of plays results in a change of possession starting at the opposing team's own five-yard line. Official Rules

Unified Flag Football, which began in 2018, is one of 22 sports sponsored by the IHSAA and one of two co-ed sports along with Unified Track and Field which debuted in 2014.

About the Draw

To conduct the random drawing for the Unified Flag Football State Tournament, the IHSAA places ping-pong balls representing each school in each sectional into a lottery-style air mix machine. A motorized fan in the bottom of the machine blows the balls around the inside of the transparent container and air then forces each ball up through a tube in random order. For example, the first ball retrieved from the machine will be the visiting team in game one with the second ball representing the home team in game one. The third ball to come out is the visitor in game two and the fourth ball the home team in game two. That same method is followed through all eight sectionals.


