Forest Park's Charlie Hasenour named to National Student Advisory Council

Charlie Hasenour of Forest Park High School and a member of the IHSAA's Student Advisory Committee, has been selected as one of 16 student leaders across the country to serve on the National Federation's Inaugural National Student Advisory Council.

Hasenour, along with Megan Allen of Monticello High School in Illinois, will represent Section 4 on the national stage which is made up of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The 16 student leaders, all juniors in classification and all involved in sports or performing arts activities in their schools, will attend a number of meetings throughout the 2024 calendar year to provide the Indianapolis-based National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) with student perspectives.

A junior at the southwestern Indiana school located in Ferdinand, Ind., Hasenour is a swimmer, plays basketball and helped lead the Rangers soccer team to a state runner-up finish in October as the team's goalkeeper.

Hasenour was nominated for this position by the Indiana High School Athletic Association and is in his first of two years serving on the IHSAA's [Student Advisory Committee](#).

The IHSAA is a voluntary, not-for-profit organization that is self-supporting without the use of tax monies. Since its founding in 1903, the Association's mission has been to provide wholesome, educational athletics for the secondary schools of Indiana. Its 411-member high schools - public, institutional, parochial, and private – pay no annual membership fee or incur entry fees to play in the Association's tournaments. A state tournament series is conducted annually in 22 sports, 10 for girls, 10 for boys and two co-eds (unified flag football, unified track and field). A 19-person board of directors, elected by member school principals, governs the organization.
